Curricular Goals and Objectives For

OUTPATIENT SURGERY

Goals:

- 1. The resident will demonstrate skill in evaluating and selecting the appropriate patient for outpatient or office-based surgery
- 2. The resident will perform basic office-based skin surgeries such as punch biopsy, minor burn care and debridment, shave biopsies, elliptical excision, simple and intermediate wound repair, ingrown nail surgery, cryotherapy, hyfercation and curettage.
- 3. The resident will demonstrate skill in co-managing surgical conditions with the appropriate surgical consultant

Objectives:

Patient Care

- 1. By the end of PGY-1 the resident will select patients appropriate for office-based surgery or refer appropriately for outpatient surgery
- 2. By the end of PGY-2 the resident will describe and competently perform the following procedures:
 - a. Cryotherapy
 - b. Shave Biopsy
 - c. Punch Biopsy
 - d. Simple laceration repair
- 3. By the end of PGY-3 the resident will describe and competently perform the following procedures
 - a. Ingrown toenail management and permanent destruction
 - b. Hyfercation and currettage
 - c. Elliptical biopsy
 - d. Intermediate wound repair
 - e. Lipoma removal
 - f. Evacuation and management of thrombose hemorrhoids
- 4. By the end of PGY-3 the resident will demonstrate expertise in selecting appropriate codes and modifiers for billing.

Medical Knowledge

- 1. The resident will describe basic skin and surgical anatomy
- 2. The resident will explain wound physiology, care and healing process
- 3. The resident will perform clinical assessment including history, physical examination, laboratory evaluation and differential diagnosis of key signs and symptoms of surgical conditions
- 4. The resident will demonstrate skill in choosing and administering appropriate anesthesia
- 5. The resident will describe and obtain appropriate informed consent
- 6. The resident will perform appropriate preoperative risk assessment including surgical risk assessment, comorbid disease, antibiotic prophylaxis, beta-blocker prophylaxis and patient education and preparation.
- 7. The resident will manage postoperative pain appropriately and effectively
- 8. The resident will identify and manage postoperative complications appropriately

<u>Interpersonal and Communication Skills</u>

- 1. The resident will demonstrate counseling of the risks and benefits of a proposed surgery and obtain informed consent
- 2. The resident will demonstrate appropriate postoperative patient education and anticipatory guidance
- 3. The resident will communicate effectively with consulting surgeries to ensure a smooth transition of care for the patient

Professionalism

- 1. The resident will demonstrate appropriate respect for the patient during all patient encounter
- 2. The resident will demonstrate respect for the healthcare team assisting him/her in the care of his patients
- 3. The resident will communicate results of laboratory tests or pathology results completely and timely to ensure excellent patient care.
- 4. The resident will demonstrate appropriate and timely communication with consultants.

Practice-Based Learning and Improvement

- 1. The resident will perform and interpret KOH analysis of skin scrapings
- 2. The resident will describe the establishment of office procedures to ensure the appropriate management of pathology specimens, tracking of results and communication results to patients and consultants
- 3. The resident will perform a PDSA improvement project to demonstrate understanding of quality improvement techniques
- 4. The resident will follow his/her patient in follow up after a procedure to assess the outcomes of the procedures he/she performed and analyze for needed improvement in technique.

Systems-Based Learning

- 1. The resident will describe and manage the referral process for a patient being referred to a surgical specialist
- 2. The resident will describe the process for obtain insurance authorization before performing certain procedures or referrals
- 3. The resident will describe and obtain advanced beneficiary notice (ABN) on Medicare patients before performing elective procedures.

METHODS:

Didatic sessions at Family Practice Center. Direct observation of procedures performed in the office during dermatology, colpscopy and minor surgery clinics at Family Practice Center. Rotations with general surgeons, colo-rectal surgeons, podiatrists and plastic surgeons

Evaluation/Assessment:

Comments of attending family medicine faculty, surgeons and podiatrists.
